Summer

	Find internship opportunities . If financially possible, this can positively impact college applications or future employment applications.
	Seek out volunteer opportunities. Volunteer work can help learn new skills, gain experience, make new contacts, and show potential employers that you are a caring individual who also has drive and ambition.
	Visit with students who are home from college. This will give you great insight into what college life is like.
	Create an activities resume. An activities resume will help with career exploration and improve opportunities for college acceptance, scholarships, and job applications.
	Create a budget. This can include learning how to manage your expenses and how to save, especially if you have a part-time job. Ask your family for help.

	Meet with the school counselor. This is an important transition time for your future in preparing for college,

Fall

- career, apprenticesnips, or armed services.
- ☐ **Discuss your future with your family.** To help you stay focused and motivated, set goals for the year.
- ☐ Take the PSAT in October. This is a preliminary test that helps students practice for the SAT and assess their academic skills. Juniors who do well on the test are eligible for scholarship opportunities.
- ☐ Consider taking the Armed Services Vocational Assessment Battery (ASVAB). This is a very beneficial FREE assessment for ALL students. The ASVAB assists with career exploration, is required for joining the military, and predicts how college-bound students will score on the ACT.
- ☐ Visit colleges and attend college fairs.



Winter

- Review results of PSAT and/or ASVAB. Discuss career and academic strengths as well as areas for growth and improvement with your family, your school counselor, and other trusted adults at school or in your community.
- ☐ Be informed about upcoming ACT and SAT registration deadlines and testing dates.
- □ Participate in extracurricular activities. Employers and colleges are looking for well-rounded individuals.

Spring

- ☐ Take the ACT or SAT test. Even if you are unsure about your future plans, this may help you make a better decision about your future. Talk to your counselor about fee waivers to see if you qualify.
- □ Talk to your counselor about your senior schedule. Consider enrolling in fall dual enrollment or AP classes to earn college credit, to explore careers, and to find out what campus classes are like.
- ☐ Meet with a Career Launch Career Advisor. If you are still unsure about your future, the Career Launch program can provide additional career exploration, help you determine a pathway that fits your interests and skills, and other employment opportunities and resources to support your future.
